<p>Write a set of instructions on how to put a fire out.</p>	<p>Read a story about a hero and talk to an adult about it.</p>	<p>Bake an item that may have been in Thomas Farrinor's baker's shop. We will be making Great Fire of London cakes in school.</p>	<p>Create a fact file about The Great Fire of London. Present as a poster, booklet etc.</p>	<p>What should I do in an emergency? Create a poster explaining what to do in an emergency. Do you know your address? Your telephone number? Who to ring in an emergency?</p>

Challenge: 3 times table.</p>	<p>Make a model of a Tudor house, like those during the Great Fire of London. e.g. use lolly pop sticks, sticks, paper, salt dough etc Try to be as creative as you can.</p>	<p>Make a picture showing a fire using any materials you like e.g. paint, drawings etc.</p> 	<p>Practise counting backwards and forwards in ones from any number between 0-100. e.g. 17, 18, 19... 88, 87, 86...</p> <p>Then practise counting forwards and backwards in 2's, 5's and 10's starting with any number between 0-100.</p>
