



I wonder who you will find down in the woods?

<p>Go for a walk with a grown-up and look for signs of spring. Talk about what you can see. Can you spot any flowers growing? What is the weather like? Did you see any animals? You could take a photo or draw a picture of what you see on your spring walk.</p>	<p>Lots of baby animals are born in the spring. Find out the names of these baby animals: duck, pig, sheep, cow and chicken. You could ask a grown-up to help you find the answers on the Internet or in a book.</p>	<p>Make a weather chart to show what the spring weather is like each day. You could cut out the weather pictures from the second sheet to stick on your chart, or you could draw a picture of the weather each day.</p>
<p>In the spring, lots of flowers grow. Draw or paint a picture of a flower. What colours do you need? Remember to draw the stem, some leaves and some petals.</p>	<p>Hetty the Hen had 10 eggs. On Monday 4 eggs hatched into chicks. How many eggs were left in Hetty's nest? You could draw a picture of the eggs to help you work out the answer.</p>	<p>Little Red Riding Hood stopped to talk to the Big Bad Wolf. Do you think this was a good idea? Talk to a grown-up at home about what she should have done.</p>
<p>Draw a map to show Little Red Riding Hood how to get to Grandma's Cottage.</p>	<p>The story of Little Red Riding Hood is set in the woods. Make a list of any other stories that are set in the woods.</p>	<p>Little Red Riding Hood filled her basket with goodies for her Grandma. She took 6 cakes and 3 biscuits. How many treats did she take altogether? You could draw a picture to help you work it out.</p>
