A tanka is a type of Japanese poetry. It has five lines and each line has either 5 or 7 syllables.

They follow the pattern:

5, 7, 5, 7, 7.

Look at this example:

The great wave crashes (5) under Mount Fuji's cold peak. (7) Rushing water roars, (5) courageous fishermen try (7) to escape the sea's clutches. (7)

Can you write your own tanka inspired by the image?
